BUILDING REPRESENTATIVE RETREAT

Building representatives play an important role in our Association. They are the members who support you in your school and make sure you have the most up-to-date information on the many issues we face. On November 8 & 9, many building reps from over 20 schools participated in a training to help move their work forward. Sessions included starting and facilitating an effective Faculty Advisory Council, holding productive 10-minute meetings, and building leadership teams. Your building reps also learned how to support you and identify issues that may require outside assistance. Delegate Alice Cain (District 30) shared the education work being done on the state level, including the work on Maryland's Blueprint for the Future, and how she is getting guidance from her education cabinet composed of educators including some of our TAAAC members.
